

 Issue interim emergency guidance to CME to issue temporary 30day extensions on medical cards when:

The driver is a newly diagnosed sleep apnea patient with an AHI>15 when the treating physician has recommended PAP therapy and when provided documentation from the DME or treating physician that they are unable to obtain PAP to dispense to the patient.

Actions the MRB could take in response to the recall to ease current certification problems for drivers.

- Issue interim emergency guidance to medical examiners to issue 30-day extensions to existing medical cards for drivers who are using a recalled Phillips PAP who also:
 - Have been evaluated using the AASM Sample patient assessment by their treating physician.
 - The treating physician recommends they discontinue using their affected PAP.
 - The treating physician and/or DME document that another device or alternative treatment options are not available.

Actions the MRB could take in response to the recall to ease current certification problems for drivers.

- Modify the August 26, 2016 MRB recommendations related to MRB Task 16-1.
- VI. Treatment: Oral appliance
- A. MRB Recommendation: A driver with a diagnosis of moderate to severe OSA should try PAP therapy before oral appliance therapy,

<u>Remove "should try PAP therapy before oral appliance therapy"</u> and allow OAT or MRD as a first line treatment option for drivers with AHI>15 but <than 25.

This would bring MRB recommendations in line with current AASM and AADSM clinical practice parameters.

Actions the MRB could take in response to the recall to ease current certification problems for drivers.

ResMed current order allocation process.

Alternative ResMed order allocation process for CMV drivers with or seeking a DOT medical card with diagnosed OSA >15. Top priority for CMV drivers with AHI>25.

• ResMed / DME policy on "releasing" 2nd user or "cadaver" CPAP.

Actions the MRB could take in response to the recall that may increase the availability of sleep apnea treatment for drivers during the crisis.
