Part 1 Section 1 - Introduction

The Motor Carrier Safety Assistance Program (MCSAP) is a Federal grant program that provides financial assistance to States to help reduce the number and severity of accidents and hazardous materials incidents involving commercial motor vehicles (CMV). The goal of the MCSAP is to reduce CMV-involved accidents, fatalities, and injuries through consistent, uniform, and effective CMV safety programs.

A State lead MCSAP agency, as designated by its Governor, is eligible to apply for grant funding by submitting a commercial vehicle safety plan (CVSP), in accordance with the provisions of [49 CFR 350.201](#) and [205](#). The lead agency must submit the State's CVSP to the FMCSA Division Administrator on or before August 1 of each year. For a State to receive funding, the CVSP needs to be complete and include all required documents. Currently, the State must submit a performance-based plan each year to receive MCSAP funds.

The FAST Act required the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration (FMCSA) to “prescribe procedures for a State to submit a multiple-year plan and annual updates thereto, under which the State agrees to assume responsibility for improving motor carrier safety by adopting and enforcing State regulations, standards, and orders that are compatible with the regulations, standards, and orders of the Federal Government on commercial motor vehicle safety and hazardous materials transportation safety.”

The online CVSP tool (eCVSP) outlines the State's CMV safety objectives, strategies, activities and performance measures and is organized into the following five parts:

The MCSAP program includes the eCVSP tool to assist States in developing and monitoring their grant applications. The eCVSP provides ease of use and promotes a uniform, consistent process for all States to complete and submit their plans. States and territories will use the eCVSP to complete the CVSP and to submit a 3-year plan or an Annual Update to a 3-year plan. As used within the eCVSP, the term ‘State’ means all the States, the District of Columbia, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, American Samoa, Guam, and the Virgin Islands.

Within the Florida Highway Patrol (FHP) resides the Office of Commercial Vehicle Enforcement (OCVE). The OCVE is the Governor's designated lead agency responsible for commercial vehicle operations for our state. Along with the other members of FHP, our mission is to promote a safe and secure Florida through professional law enforcement and traffic safety awareness. Our values are Courtesy, Service, and Protection. These simple core values provide the foundation for our troopers to become the consummate public servant. To that end, the mission for the members of the OCVE is as follows:

- Reduce the number and severity of commercial motor vehicle (CMV) related crashes.
- Protect the state's highway and bridge systems from accelerated damage.
- Remove dangerous motor carriers, drivers, and vehicles from our highways.

The OCVE also has a well-established and diverse Local Agents Program. These agents function in the same capacity of a FHP/OCVE trooper. The agent members include Cape Coral Police Department, Collier County Sheriff's Office, and Palm Beach County Sheriff's Office. These agents function as force multipliers in support of the FHP mission.

The OCVE maintains a comprehensive CMV enforcement program with 285 positions primarily assigned to the MCSAP Basic & Incentive program. Of these, 255 are sworn law enforcement officers and 30 positions are comprised of civilian investigative, administrative, or managerial staff.

Our goals and objectives are accomplished through our aggressive enforcement and education programs. The OCVE troopers conduct driver/vehicle safety inspections; post crash inspections; weight, size and registration enforcement; traffic enforcement; compliance investigations; Security Contact Review (SCR) visits to Hazardous Material (HM) carriers as well as other designated "at risk" carriers; and public awareness education by use of the No Zone campaign, Share the Road Safely, and other informational outreach methods. Our members also conduct more traditional law enforcement functions to include traffic enforcement and drug interdiction.

Troopers are trained and certified to conduct Commercial Vehicle Safety Alliance (CVSA) Level I-VII inspections. 190 troopers maintain Hazardous Materials certification, 110 hold Passenger Carrier (PC) certification, and 21 are trained to conduct Level VI radiological inspections.

Additionally, there are 10 local law enforcement officers participating in the Local Agents Program who are certified to conduct CVSA Levels I-V and VII inspections.

The OCVE has two troops with a total of 12 sub-district offices and access to over 20 fixed scale facilities, most of which are complete with inspection pits and comfort stations, strategically located throughout the state. These stations were designed to provide as much opportunity as possible for truck drivers to take driving breaks and to rest while traveling on Florida's highways and to provide a safe location for conducting CMV safety inspections. Troopers have been trained to conduct roadside inspections in areas where their safety will not be in jeopardy by instructing drivers to proceed to a location that provides a better level of safety.

The OCVE has recognized three primary challenges concerning the goals for reducing overall traffic crashes resulting in fatalities. These challenges include trends of contributory events in relation to specific high crash locations, congestion of transportation systems, and public education of commercial motor vehicle operations.

Although the OCVE has a comprehensive commercial motor vehicle safety enforcement program, we have recognized that multiple studies show driver behavior as being a primary factor in commercial motor vehicle related crashes that lead to injuries and fatalities. Subsequently, the OCVE has responded with increased traffic enforcement efforts that have focused on moving infractions, distracted driving, fatigued driving, and impaired driving through special operations focusing on Level III inspections. One of the primary challenges has been to identify specific violations and locations that are contributing to crashes. OCVE has utilized a combination of historical knowledge, citizen complaints, and data driven programs such as the Data Driven Approaches to Crime & Traffic Safety (DDACTS), Signal 4 Analytics and Arrive Alive Hot Spot programs to proactively concentrate enforcement efforts on the violations identified in relation to the specific high crash location (e.g., speeding and following too closely on the interstate).

The OCVE has continued to observe increased congestion along arterial roadways where most enforcement is conducted. One of our primary considerations while conducting roadside enforcement is to ensure the safety of the motoring public, as many motorists have demonstrated they become distracted by police action on the roadside. Particularly in highly urbanized areas, the OCVE has worked with the Department of Transportation to construct roadside pull-off areas along the interstate. Additionally, members have historically been instructed to transition traffic stops to safe locations to conduct roadside enforcement.

Many from the general public have misconceptions regarding the necessity and capabilities of commercial motor vehicle operations. While often seen as a nuisance on the roadway, commercial motor vehicles have continued to be essential for a strong economy. Drivers operating in proximity to property and passenger carriers have frequently demonstrated a disregard or lack of education for blind spots, stopping capabilities, and tracking capabilities of commercial motor vehicles. The OCVE has actively sponsored and/or participated in public awareness programs such as Arrive Alive, Safe DRIVE, No-Zone, Teens and Trucks, CVSA's Operation Safe Drive, Brake Safety Awareness Week, and Roadcheck. Outreach sources including public speaking, media interviews, public service ads, billboards, dynamic message boards, digital advertising, and electronic social networking applications have been utilized during these campaigns to educate the public about the value of the transportation industry and citizen safety in relation to commercial motor vehicle operations.

The State's crash reduction goal is to reduce CMV-related fatalities by 1% each year, or 3% by 2020. Baseline: 228 fatalities. 2018 goal: <227 fatalities; 2019 goal: <225 fatalities; 2020 goal: <223 fatalities.

During normal and overtime hours, the OCVE will utilize patrol vehicles to concentrate enforcement efforts in high crash corridors within each sub-district. Current crash data will be utilized to determine hot spots throughout these corridors. Throughout the course of the year, up to 178 troopers will be assigned to the high crash corridors for a minimum of 8,000 combined enforcement hours with 7,200 contacts and 7,200 inspections annually.

Improvement of overall CMV safety is expected by performing 100,000 driver/vehicle safety inspections during the grant year. Driver focus will continue with 35.4%, or 35,400, Level III inspections. Fixed inspection facilities are utilized to focus on Level I inspections due to safety concerns. DDACTS will be utilized to determine work zones and schedules. The OCVE's Carrier Investigation Unit(OCVE-CIU) contributes to the primary mission of reducing the number and severity of commercial motor vehicle traffic crashes by providing education and enforcement to principals directly involved in the safety fitness of commercial motor vehicle operations.

The CIU utilizes most recent metrics provided by the FMCSA Compass Portal, crash data, and similar factors to assign resources based on risk associated with commercial vehicle operations behavior.

CIU Sergeants will coordinate with FMCSA prior to initiating a compliance investigation on an Interstate motor carrier, or Intrastate motor carriers of hazardous materials, passengers or household goods.

Intrastate motor carriers, except (A)(2) below, will be selected for compliance investigations based on the following criteria:

- A. Just Cause in Order of Priority will be based on any single criterion or combination of criteria. Criteria 1-4 will be given the highest priority with remaining criteria to be assigned by a supervisor.
 1. High Risk Motor Carriers.
 2. Mandatory Compliance Investigations for new entrant motor carriers.
 3. Significant crashes and CMV traffic crashes involving a fatality where the post-crash inspection demonstrates that a compliance investigation is warranted.
 4. Complaints on motor carriers assigned by the Compliance Investigation Commander or higher authority
 5. Enforcement follow-up (between 90 and 365 days from initial investigation) with manager approval.
 6. Traffic crash involving a fatality or serious bodily injuries and the CMV driver is at fault or when defective equipment on the CMV was a causative factor.
 7. Complaints from the public of a non-frivolous nature received on a motor carrier that can be supported by BASICS, or other independent methods.
 8. Moderate Risk motor carriers.
 9. Significant hazardous material incident.
 10. Traffic crashes involving a fatality or serious bodily injuries and the CMV driver is not at fault and the motor carrier currently exceeds threshold for one or more BASICS for Crash, Unsafe Driving, Hours of Service, Vehicle

Maintenance, or Passenger Carrier Crashes involving injuries.

11. Non-compliance with insurance requirements.
 12. Risk motor carriers.
 13. Carriers with acute and/or critical violations discovered within the previous 12 months.
- B. Lists of identified carriers will be prioritized through ACE. Compliance Investigation Commander or designee will be responsible for reviewing the list of motor carriers and assigning compliance investigation members to conduct compliance investigations based on the priorities listed above.
- C. All compliance investigations will be onsite and should be conducted at the carrier's principal place of business. The two types of compliance investigations are comprehensive (investigation all seven BASIC's) and focused (only investigating three or less BASIC's as applicable, determined by the FMCSA Portal).

Due to the nature of operations involving commercial motor vehicles transporting passengers and vehicles transporting hazardous materials in cargo tanks, the CIU prioritizes educational and enforcement efforts toward those operations. Data provided in the Behavior Analysis and Safety Improvement Categories (BASICs) organizes prioritization efforts and determines the appropriate level of intervention. The OCVE-CI requires Level I or Level V inspections for passenger carrying operations pursuant to FMCSA policy MC-ECS-2014-001.

Compliance investigations are assigned to the 19 members of the CIU. These members are also responsible for conducting new entrant safety audits; therefore, scheduling and work assignments occur during regular and overtime operations, and are adjusted with emerging priorities.

The CIU implemented a trainer instructor program in order to train internal CI members. Two members currently maintain instructor certification for the department. All members in the CIU maintain certification standards for CVSA Parts A and B, General Hazardous Materials, Cargo Tank, Compliance Investigation and New Entrant Safety Audit. Some members maintain the Passenger Vehicle Inspection certification, as needed by the department. The Department conducts in-service training routinely and will implement CSA phasing training as it is offered.

In addition to our planned routine enforcement activities described in the Crash Reduction Goal, the OCVE will use regular and overtime hours to conduct high visibility traffic enforcement waves for a two week period during each quarter. During these waves, up to 196 troopers and 34 supervisors will focus specifically on the driver behavior of CMVs and passenger vehicles around CMVs. Members will take enforcement action for violations of distracted driving; moving traffic laws/infractions; safety belt use; driver qualification and status; driver impairment; driver fatigue; and record of duty status.

When feasible, the OCVE will coordinate enforcement activities with neighboring states for the purpose of conducting multi-state enforcement initiatives. Also, we will partner with our traditional FHP aircraft patrol to deploy fixed wing aircraft to enhance our patrols.

The goal of Florida's New Entrant Program is to reduce the number and severity of crashes involving commercial motor vehicles by reviewing interstate carriers to ensure that they have effective safety management programs. Florida proposes to conduct 2,000 Interstate New Entrant safety audits within the statutory time frames by utilizing 19 full-time and 3 part-time New Entrant Investigators supervised by 1 Lieutenant, 3 Sergeants, and 1 Captain. Administrative program efforts will be conducted by 1 or more full-time, non-sworn staff persons.

Activity Plan for FY 2018 - 2020: Include a description of the activities proposed to help achieve the objectives. If group audits are planned, include an estimate of the number of group audits.

The OCVE plans to conduct 500 Safety Audits each quarter (2,000 total) within the required statutory time limits, as well as 6 Group Safety Audits.

Safety Audits that qualify will be processed through the Off-site New Entrant initiative. Florida expects such participation will enhance the development of this project, which will provide another opportunity to improve efficiency within the New Entrant Safety Audit Program. Investigators will conduct On-Site Safety Audits for those who do not qualify for Off-Site Audits. Safety Audits that require a further investigation will be reassigned as a Compliance Investigation.

Group Safety Audits will be conducted in high New Entrant areas around the state as inventory dictates. Emphasis will be placed on program participants who have been in the system the longest in order to meet required statutory time limits.

The OCVE's New Entrant supervising Sergeants will review all audit reports for quality, completeness, and accuracy throughout the month and will hold monthly unit meetings to monitor progress toward the goals. Group Safety Audits will be scheduled at the start of each quarter.

The supervising Sergeants will use FMCSA reports to monitor the timeline requirements in order to prevent overdue carriers from appearing in the inventory. In order to remediate the existing inventory of overdue Safety Audits, the Sergeants will follow-up with their assigned SA Investigators weekly to ensure that overdue Safety Audits are completed in a timely manner and prioritized according to the length of time they have been overdue.

If connectivity is unavailable, troopers are instructed to contact their district office to check carrier status. Each office is equipped with connectivity to the Portal and sub-systems. Locally defined fields in Aspen include selections for the trooper to indicate if the carrier was found OOS and if an OOS carrier's address was confirmed.

The State will conduct 1,700 PC inspections during the grant year. Currently, 114 troopers are certified to conduct PC inspections and may participate in periodic special enforcement operation details focusing on passenger carriers, including curbside motorcoach service areas, during both regular and overtime work hours, up to 3,400

combined enforcement hours annually. February, May, July, and December typically see more passenger carriers on Florida's roadways; therefore, we will designate one or more of these months as a Passenger Carrier focus month in an effort to increase inspection activity.

Monthly review of Safetynet, A&I, and agency project activity reports to determine actual activity hours and number of PC inspections captured. A&I will be reviewed at the end of the grant period to determine if the CMV PC-related fatality reduction objective is being attained.

The OCVE will implement a comprehensive initiative to convey safety messages to commercial motor vehicle drivers and all other Florida motorists focusing on No Zone/Share the Road messages and conveying the dangers of Drowsy Driving. The OCVE will secure a combination of public service announcements placed on billboards statewide; digital advertisements targeted to commercial motor vehicles, online and/or in, mobile applications and traffic mobile applications; broadcast and/or internet radio; and social media platforms, including Facebook, Twitter and Instagram. Motorists will be exposed to consistent safety messages on and off the roadway, reminding them to share the road and take a break when drowsy.

The primary No Zone safety message is "If you can't see my rearview mirrors, I can't see you," reminding motorists to

stay out of a commercial motor vehicle's No Zone by explaining the No Zone areas. The campaign's secondary message will be a drowsy driving message, reminding commercial motor vehicle drivers to "Take a Break" when drowsy and abide by all hours-of-service regulations.

316.302 Commercial motor vehicles; safety regulations; transporters and shippers of hazardous materials; enforcement.—

(1)(a) All owners and drivers of commercial motor vehicles that are operated on the public highways of this state while engaged in interstate commerce are subject to the rules and regulations contained in 49 C.F.R. parts 382, 383, 385, 386, and 390-397.

(b) Except as otherwise provided in this section, all owners or drivers of commercial motor vehicles that are engaged in intrastate commerce are subject to the rules and regulations contained in 49 C.F.R. parts 382, 383, 385, 386, and 390-397, as such rules and regulations existed on December 31, 2018.

(c) The emergency exceptions provided by 49 C.F.R. s. 392.82 also apply to communications by utility drivers and utility contractor drivers during a Level 1 activation of the State Emergency Operations Center, as provided in the Florida Comprehensive Emergency Management plan, or during a state of emergency declared by executive order or proclamation of the Governor.

(d) Except as provided in s. 316.228 for rear overhang lighting and flagging requirements for intrastate operations, the requirements of this section supersede all other safety requirements of this chapter for commercial motor vehicles.

(e) A person who operates a commercial motor vehicle solely in intrastate commerce which does not transport hazardous materials in amounts that require placarding pursuant to 49 C.F.R. part 172 need not comply with the requirements of electronic logging devices and hours of service supporting documents as provided in 49 C.F.R. parts 385, 386, 390, and 395 until December 31, 2019.

(2)(a) A person who operates a commercial motor vehicle solely in intrastate commerce not transporting any hazardous material in amounts that require placarding pursuant to 49 C.F.R. part 172 need not comply with 49 C.F.R. ss. 391.11(b)(1) and 395.3.

(b) Except as provided in 49 C.F.R. s. 395.1, a person who operates a commercial motor vehicle solely in intrastate commerce not transporting any hazardous material in amounts that require placarding pursuant to 49 C.F.R. part 172 may not drive:

1. More than 12 hours following 10 consecutive hours off duty; or
2. For any period after the end of the 16th hour after coming on duty following 10 consecutive hours off duty.

The provisions of this paragraph do not apply to drivers of utility service vehicles as defined in 49 C.F.R. s. 395.2.

(c) Except as provided in 49 C.F.R. s. 395.1, a person who operates a commercial motor vehicle solely in intrastate commerce not transporting any hazardous material in amounts that require placarding pursuant to 49 C.F.R. part 172 may not drive after having been on duty more than 70 hours in any period of 7 consecutive days or more than 80 hours in any period of 8 consecutive days if the motor carrier operates every day of the week. Thirty-four consecutive hours off duty shall constitute the end of any such period of 7 or 8 consecutive days. This weekly limit does not apply to a person who operates a commercial motor vehicle solely within this state while transporting, during harvest periods, any unprocessed agricultural products or unprocessed food or fiber that is subject to seasonal harvesting from place of harvest to the first place of processing or storage or from place of harvest directly to market or while transporting livestock, livestock feed, or farm supplies directly related to

growing or harvesting agricultural products. Upon request of the Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles, motor carriers shall furnish time records or other written verification to that department so that the Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles can determine compliance with this subsection. These time records must be furnished to the Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles within 2 days after receipt of that department's request. Falsification of such information is subject to a civil penalty. This paragraph does not apply to operators of farm labor vehicles operated during a state of emergency declared by the Governor or operated pursuant to s. 570.07(21) or to drivers of utility service vehicles as defined in 49 C.F.R. s. 395.2.

(d) A person who operates a commercial motor vehicle solely in intrastate commerce not transporting any hazardous material in amounts that require placarding pursuant to 49 C.F.R. part 172 within a 150 air-mile radius of the location where the vehicle is based need not comply with 49 C.F.R. s. 395.8 if the requirements of 49 C.F.R. s. 395.1(e)(1)(ii), (iii)(A) and (C), and (v) are met.

(e) A person who operates a commercial motor vehicle solely in intrastate commerce is exempt from subsection (1) while transporting agricultural products, including horticultural or forestry products, from farm or harvest place to the first place of processing or storage, or from farm or harvest place directly to market. However, such person must comply with 49 C.F.R. parts 382, 392, and 393, and with 49 C.F.R. ss. 396.3(a)(1) and 396.9. A vehicle or combination of vehicles operated pursuant to this paragraph having a gross vehicle weight of 26,001 pounds or more or having three or more axles on the power unit, regardless of weight, must display the name of the vehicle owner or motor carrier and the municipality or town where the vehicle is based on each side of the power unit in letters that contrast with the background and that are readable from a distance of 50 feet. A person who violates this vehicle identification requirement may be assessed a penalty as provided in s. 316.3025(3) (a).

(f) A person who operates a commercial motor vehicle having a gross vehicle weight, gross vehicle weight rating, and gross combined weight rating of less than 26,001 pounds solely in intrastate commerce and who is not transporting hazardous materials in amounts that require placarding pursuant to 49 C.F.R. part 172 is exempt from subsection (1). However, such person must comply with 49 C.F.R. parts 382, 392, and 393 and 49 C.F.R. ss. 396.3(a)(1) and 396.9.

(g) A person whose driving record shows no convictions for the preceding 3 years and who, as of October 1, 1988, is employed as a driver-salesperson, as defined in 49 C.F.R. s. 395.2, and who operates solely in intrastate commerce, is exempt from 49 C.F.R. part 391.

(h) A person who is an employee of an electric utility, as defined in s. 361.11, or a telephone company, as defined in s. 364.02, and who operates a commercial motor vehicle solely in intrastate commerce and within a 200 air-mile radius of the location where the vehicle is based, is exempt from 49 C.F.R. ss. 396.11 and 396.13 and 49 C.F.R. part 391, subparts D and E.

(i) A person whose driving record shows no traffic convictions, pursuant to s. 322.61, during the 2-year period immediately preceding the application for the commercial driver license, who is otherwise qualified as a driver under 49 C.F.R. part 391, and who operates a commercial vehicle in intrastate commerce only shall be exempt from the requirements of 49 C.F.R. part 391, subpart E, s. 391.41(b)(10). However, such operators are still subject to the requirements of ss. 322.12 and 322.121. As proof of eligibility, such driver shall have in his or her possession a physical examination form dated within the past 24 months.

(j) A person holding a commercial driver license who is a regularly employed driver of a commercial motor vehicle and is subject to an alcohol and controlled substance testing program related to that employment shall not be required to be part of a separate testing program for operating any bus owned and operated by a church when the driver does not receive any form of compensation for operating the bus and when the bus is used to transport people to or from church-related activities at no charge. The provisions of this paragraph may not be implemented if the Federal Government notifies the department that implementation will adversely affect the allocation of federal funds to the state.

(3) Notwithstanding any contrary provision in subsections (1) and (2), a covered farm vehicle, as defined in s. 316.003, and the operator of such vehicle are exempt from the requirements relating to controlled substances and alcohol use and testing in 49 C.F.R. part 382; commercial driver licenses in 49 C.F.R. part 383; physical

qualifications and examinations in 49 C.F.R. part 391, subpart E; hours of service of drivers in 49 C.F.R. part 395; and inspection, repair, and maintenance in 49 C.F.R. part 396, when operating:

(a) Anywhere in this state if the covered farm vehicle has a gross vehicle weight or gross vehicle weight rating, whichever is greater, of 26,001 pounds or less.

(b) Anywhere in the state of registration, or across state lines within 150 air miles of the farm or ranch with respect to which the vehicle is being operated, if the covered farm vehicle has a gross vehicle weight or gross vehicle weight rating, whichever is greater, of more than 26,001 pounds.

The provisions in this subsection do not apply to a vehicle transporting hazardous materials in amounts that require placarding pursuant to 49 C.F.R. part 172.

(4) A person who has not attained 18 years of age may not operate a commercial motor vehicle, except that a person who has not attained 18 years of age may operate a commercial motor vehicle which has a gross vehicle weight of less than 26,001 pounds while transporting agricultural products, including horticultural or forestry products, from farm or harvest place to storage or market.

(5)(a) Except as provided in this subsection, all commercial motor vehicles transporting any hazardous material on any road, street, or highway open to the public, whether engaged in interstate or intrastate commerce, and any person who offers hazardous materials for such transportation, are subject to the regulations contained in 49 C.F.R. part 107, subparts F and G, and 49 C.F.R. parts 171, 172, 173, 177, 178, and 180. Effective July 1, 1997, the exceptions for intrastate motor carriers provided in 49 C.F.R. 173.5 and 173.8 are hereby adopted.

(b) In addition to the penalties provided in s. 316.3025(3)(b), (c), (d), and (e), any motor carrier or any of its officers, drivers, agents, representatives, employees, or shippers of hazardous materials that do not comply with this subsection or any rule adopted by a state agency that is consistent with the federal rules and regulations regarding hazardous materials commits a misdemeanor of the first degree, punishable as provided in s. 775.082 or s. 775.083. To ensure compliance with this subsection, state highway patrol officers may inspect shipping documents and cargo of any vehicle known or suspected to be a transporter of hazardous materials.

(6) The Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles may adopt and revise rules to assure the safe operation of commercial motor vehicles. The Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles may enter into cooperative agreements as provided in 49 C.F.R. part 388. Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles personnel may conduct motor carrier and shipper compliance reviews for the purpose of determining compliance with this section and s. 627.7415.

(7) The state Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles shall perform the duties that are assigned to the Field Administrator, Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration under the federal rules, and an agent of that department may enforce those rules.

(8) A person who operates a commercial motor vehicle solely in intrastate commerce shall direct to the state Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles any communication that the federal rules require persons subject to the jurisdiction of the United States Department of Transportation to direct to that department.

(9) For the purpose of enforcing this section, any law enforcement officer of the Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles or duly appointed agent who holds a current safety inspector certification from the Commercial Vehicle Safety Alliance may require the driver of any commercial vehicle operated on the highways of this state to stop and submit to an inspection of the vehicle or the driver's records. If the vehicle or driver is found to be operating in an unsafe condition, or if any required part or equipment is not present or is not in proper repair or adjustment, and the continued operation would present an unduly hazardous operating condition, the officer may require the vehicle or the driver to be removed from service pursuant to the North American Standard Out-of-Service Criteria, until corrected. However, if continuous operation would not present an unduly hazardous operating condition, the officer may give written notice requiring correction of the condition within 14 days.

(a) Any member of the Florida Highway Patrol or any law enforcement officer employed by a sheriff's office or municipal police department authorized to enforce the traffic laws of this state pursuant to s. 316.640 who has reason to believe that a vehicle or driver is operating in an unsafe condition may, as provided in subsection (11), enforce the provisions of this section.

(b) Any person who fails to comply with an officer's request to submit to an inspection under this subsection commits a violation of s. 843.02 if the person resists the officer without violence or a violation of s. 843.01 if the person resists the officer with violence.

(10) This section does not apply to any nonpublic sector bus.

(11) Any traffic enforcement officer or any person otherwise authorized to enforce this section may issue a traffic citation as provided by s. 316.650 to an alleged violator of any provision of this section.

(12) In addition to any other penalty provided in this section, a person who operates a commercial motor vehicle that bears an identification number required by this section which is false, fraudulent, or displayed without the consent of the person to whom it is assigned commits a misdemeanor of the first degree, punishable as provided in s. 775.082 or s. 775.083.

(13)(a) Notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, a provision, clause, covenant, or agreement contained in, collateral to, or affecting a motor carrier transportation contract that purports to indemnify, defend, or hold harmless, or has the effect of indemnifying, defending, or holding harmless, the promisee from or against any liability for loss or damage resulting from the negligence or intentional acts or omissions of the promisee is against the public policy of this state and is void and unenforceable.

(b) As used in this subsection, the term "promisee" means the contract's promisee and any agents, employees, servants, or independent contractors who are directly responsible to the contract's promisee, except that the term does not include motor carriers which are party to a motor carrier transportation contract with the contract's promisee, including such motor carrier's agents, employees, servants, or independent contractors directly responsible to such motor carrier.

(c) This subsection only applies to motor carrier transportation contracts entered into or renewed on or after July 1, 2010.
